

V is for Venn Diagrams!

ABSTRACT

Would you like to produce Venn diagrams easily? This paper shows how you can produce stunning two-, three-, and four-way Venn diagrams by using the Graph Template Language, in particular the DRAWOVAL and DRAWTEXT statements. From my experience, Venn diagrams have typically been created in the pharmaceutical industry by using Microsoft Excel and Microsoft PowerPoint. Excel is used to first count the numbers in each group, and PowerPoint is used to generate the two- or three-way Venn diagrams. The four-way Venn diagram is largely unheard of. When someone is brave enough to tackle it manually, working out the numbers that should go in each of the 16 groups and entering the right number into the right group is usually done nervously!

INTRODUCTION

Venn diagrams were introduced in 1883 by John Venn (1834-1923), the Hull born philosopher and mathematician. They are a great way to visualize elements that are unique to only one group and simultaneously visualize elements that intersect with other groups. They are symmetrical by nature and the number of groups in a Venn diagram = 2^n (including the group outside the diagram).

Venn diagrams are built into JMP Genomics. The web applications (Oliveros, 2018) and (Hulsen, 2018) can also be used to create Venn diagrams. Sometimes you may need to keep your data within SAS and this paper will demonstrate a macro that can be used in SAS® 9.4 to create Venn diagrams. Unlike the previous paper which shows how to produce Venn diagrams using quantitative data and a specified cut-off (Harris, V is for Venn Diagrams, 2013), this paper shows how to produce Venn diagrams when the data is qualitative.

Essentially there are two sections to this macro. The first section calculates the numbers and percentages for each group of the Venn diagram and the second section produces the Venn diagram. Two types of Venn diagrams can be created: normal and proportional Venn diagrams. If you want to output a normal Venn diagram, where the circles or ellipses are all the same size, then Graph Template Language (GTL) will create the Venn diagram. If you want to output a proportional Venn diagram then the API for Google Charts will produce the Venn diagram; the inspiration for the Google Charts method came from the paper (Kruger, 2011). In the paper "Creating Proportional Venn Diagrams Using Google and SAS®", Kruger shows how the API for Google Charts can produce proportional Venn diagrams. This paper builds Kruger's paper by also calculating the numbers for each group within the Venn diagram, and also allowing the numbers in each group to be displayed on the figure.

MACRO CALL

Program 1 below illustrates how the macro call works for the %VENN macro.

Program 1: Macro Call

- 1 Define the data set name. An example data set named VENNDATA has been created in the program and is available for use. The data set is largely based on the SASHELP.CARS data set, but the dataset was modified so that some of the elements would be in the other Venn diagram groups. The information from (Jedi, 2018) was used to convert the data set into SAS datalines so that the data set could easily be created and used within the macro.
- 2 To produce a normal Venn diagram set the PROPORTIONAL macro variable value to be 0, and if you want to produce a proportional Venn diagram set the macro variable value to be 1. Normal Venn diagrams are produced by default.
- 3 If the PROPORTIONAL macro variable value is set to 0, then you are able to create two, three, or four-way Venn diagrams, by setting the VENN_DIAGRAM macro variable value to be 2, 3, or 4 respectively. For proportional Venn diagrams you are able to create two or three-way Venn diagrams.
Two-way Venn diagrams are produced by default.
- 4 The data set variables that contain the list of elements are defined here. For two-way Venn diagrams, values for the macro variables VARA and VARB are required. For three-way Venn diagrams a value for VARC is also required, and for four-way Venn diagrams a value for VARD is also required.
In the example using the VENNDATA data set then the values to be used are MAKEA, MAKEB, MAKEC or MAKED.
- 5 The labels for the sets are defined here. The value of the macro variable LABELA, is the label for the data used in the macro variable VARA. This pattern repeats for the other groups.
- 6 For normal Venn diagrams, only the numbers are displayed for each set and intersect by default. If you also want percentages to be displayed then set the PERCENTAGE macro variable value to be 1. This option only applies to normal Venn diagrams, i.e. when the PROPORTIONAL macro variable value is set to 0.
- 7 For proportional Venn diagrams, no numbers are being displayed for each set and intersect by default. If you want the numbers to be displayed in the legend then set the PROP_N_LABEL macro variable value to be 1. This option only applies to proportional Venn diagrams, i.e. when the PROPORTIONAL macro variable value is set to 0.
- 8 Define the path for your output files here.
- 9 Define the filename for your .PNG or .HTML file here. This file will show the Venn diagram.

The %VENN macro also outputs data sets in the WORK library named DISTINCT_ELEMENTS, and MERGED_ELEMENTS. The DISTINCT_ELEMENTS data set contains the elements in each group of the

sets. The MERGED_ELEMENTS dataset identifies the elements that belong to each group within the Venn diagram. These dataset can be used to assess the elements that are in each group.

The full %VENN macro code is in the APPENDIX, and is also available at:

METHOD

For normal Venn diagrams the macro works by counting the number in each group, and then using GTL to produce the Venn Diagrams with the corresponding numbers in each group displayed. The SQL procedure was used to count the elements in each group because sub querying was done so that the elements in one set and not in the other set could be calculated. For example, $A \cap B$.

For proportional Venn diagrams the numbers in each group were calculated, and were used as values in the Google Chart code which the macro created. When the outputted HTML files is open, a Venn diagram is produced with the help of the visualization API for Google Charts.

GTL FOR NORMAL VENN DIAGRAMS

Firstly a data set named TEST was created, which had two variables X and Y and had values ranging from 1 to 100. This was created so that it could be used as a blank canvas in conjunction with the SCATTERPLOT statement. This will be explained more later.

Two-way Venn Diagram Example

This paper assumes that you are familiar with GTL. For more details on using GTL please see (Harris, Hands-On Graph Template Language (GTL): Part A, 2017) or (Harris & Watson, Great Time to Learn GTL, 2018).

To produce the Venn diagram the LAYOUT OVERLAY container was used and contains the SCATTERPLOT plot statement, and DRAWOVAL and DRAWTEXT draw statements. The YAXIS and XAXIS label, line, tick marks and tick values are of no interest when producing the Venn diagram, so these are suppressed in the LAYOUT OVERLAY statement by using the option DISPLAY = NONE.

The SCATTERPLOT statement is used to essentially produce the blank canvas using the TEST dataset to enable the placement of the subsequent items for the Venn diagram by hiding the markers using the SIZE = 0 marker attributes options.

The fun part begins with the DRAWOVAL draw statements, which for two, and three-way Venn diagrams can be used to draw circles. The X and Y arguments are where the centre of the oval is going to be drawn. As you may recall the scale that was used for the blank canvas ranges from 0 to 100 for the XAXIS and YAXIS, and the X and Y arguments that are specified map directly to the values on the scale, so in the first example the centre point will be precisely at $X = 36$ and $Y = 50$. In this example the WIDTH = 45 and the HEIGHT = 60 for the oval. These are specified because it means that the ratio between the WIDTH and HEIGHT of the oval is 3:4 and this is to compensate for the fact that usually the default graph and also in this case the ratio between the WIDTH and HEIGHT of the entire graph is 4:3. Therefore the ratio that is used for the oval compensates for this and enables circles to be produced instead of ovals.

The DRAWTEXT draw statement is used to display the numbers and group names in the Venn diagram groups.

Please see Program 3 below for the example GTL code.

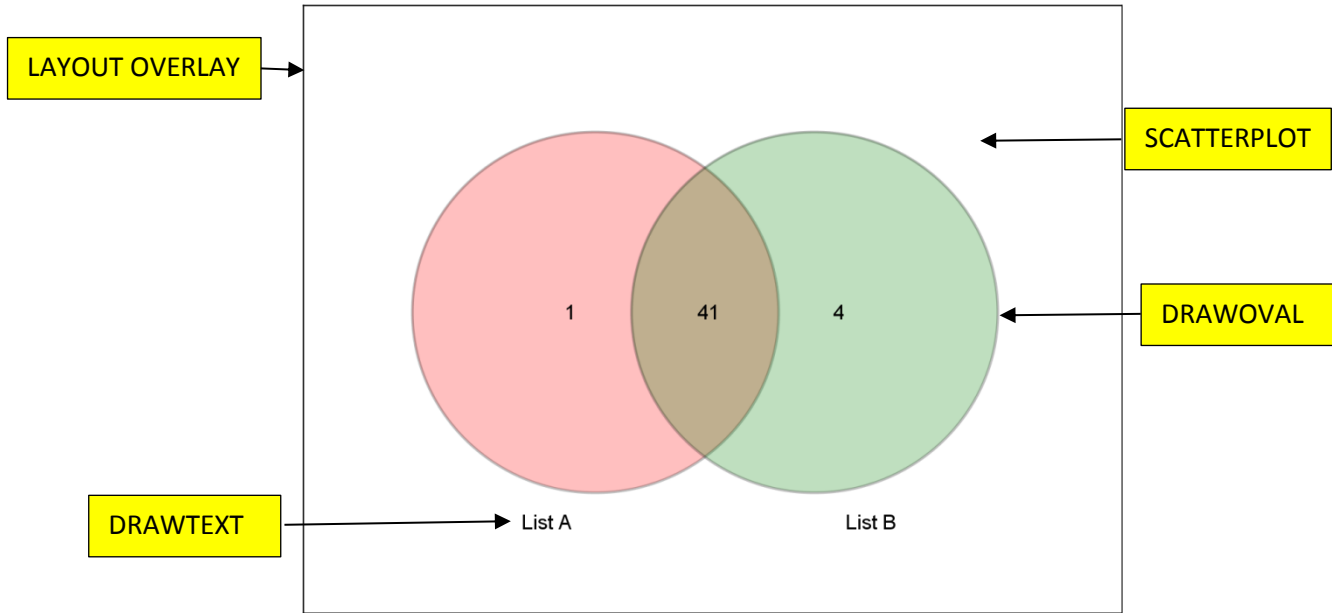


Figure 1: Two-Way Venn Diagram

Figure 1 below shows a two-way Venn diagram. From this Venn diagram you can see that there are 42 items in List A, 45 items in List B, and 41 items in the intersection of Lists A and B. The macro call for Figure 1 is below:

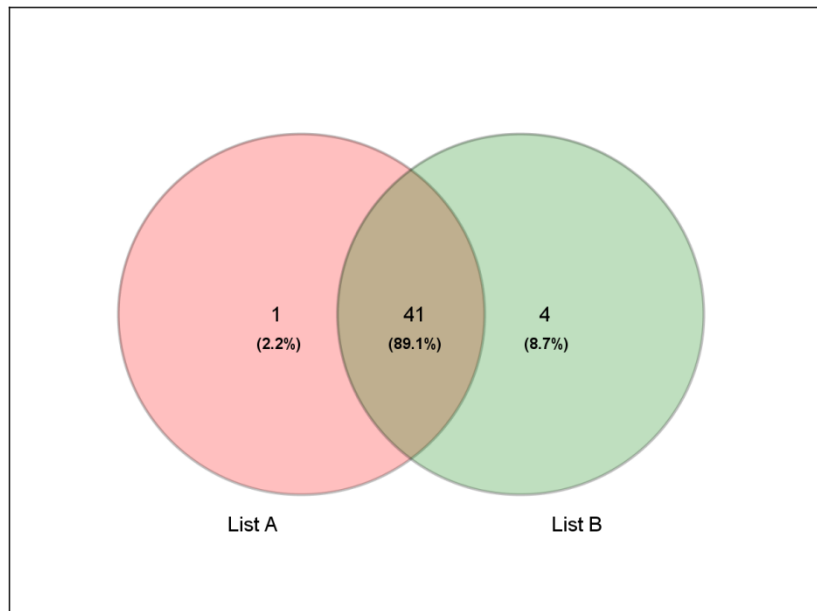


Figure 2: Two-Way Venn Diagram with Percentages

To also display the percentages on the Venn diagram, set the PERCENTAGE macro variable value to be 1. Figure 2, shows an example of the Venn diagram with percentages, and the macro call for Figure 2 is below:

Three and Four-Way Venn Diagrams

To produce three-way Venn diagrams all that is needed is to add the third variable and label to the existing two-way Venn diagram GTL code. Essentially (when the percentages are omitted from the graph) this is an extra DRAWOVAL statement for the third circle, and five more DRAWTEXT statements for the additional numbers in each group. As you can envisage the four-way Venn diagram needs an extra DRAWOVAL statement compared to the three way, and a lot more DRAWTEXT statements. To produce the ellipses the ratio of 1:4 between the WIDTH and the HEIGHT can be used in the DRAWOVAL statement, and the ROTATE argument can be used to position the ellipses in the right direction.

To produce the GTL for the four-way Venn diagram, a lot of trial and error was used to determine the location, size and rotation to use to produce a good diagram. However, there probably is a mathematical way to obtain the exact locations and dimensions for the optimal four-way Venn diagram.

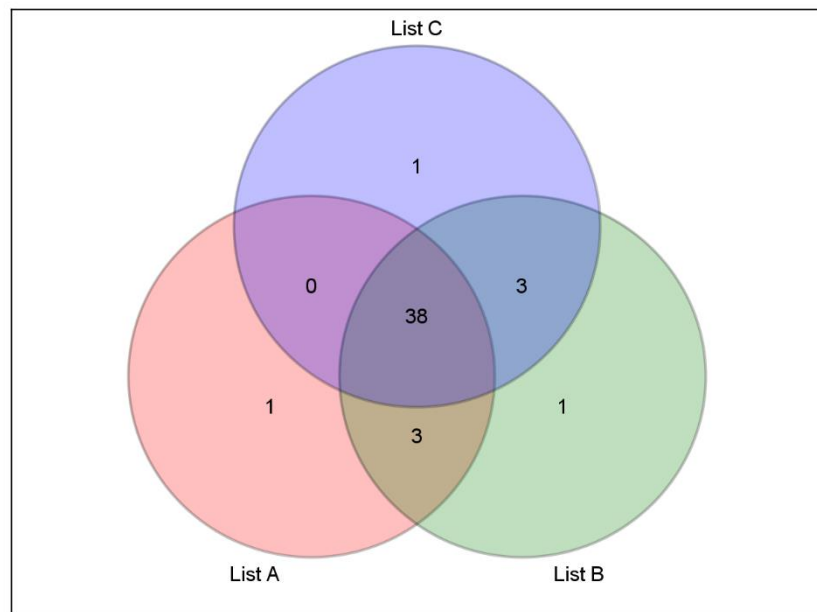


Figure 3: Three-Way Venn Diagram

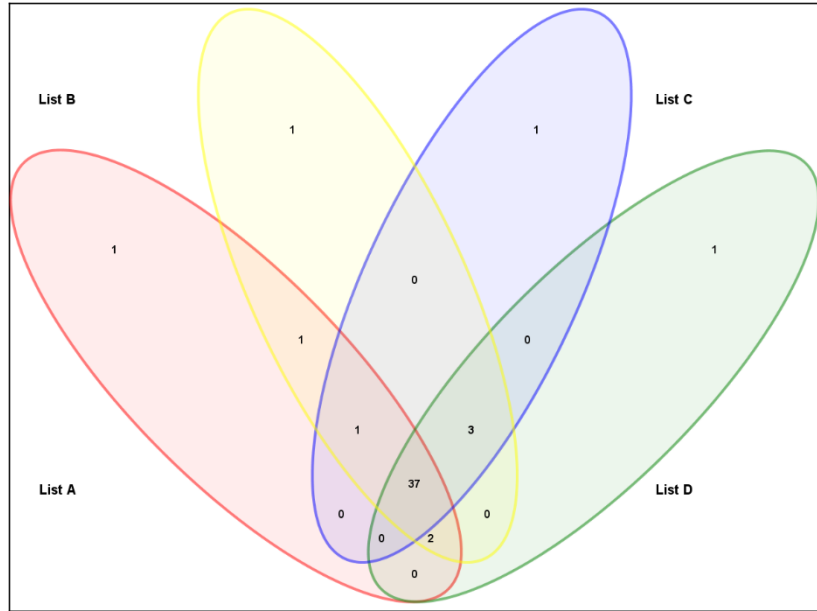


Figure 4: Four-Way Venn Diagram

Figure 3 and Figure 4 show the three- and four-way Venn diagrams respectively.

The macro calls for Figure 3 and Figure 4 are below:

* Figure 3 macro call;

The %VENN macro also allows you to produce proportional Venn diagrams. The paper (Kruger, 2011) has more details relating to the method used. The macro in this paper built upon Kruger's brilliant paper, because:

1. The API for Google Charts has been updated since 2011 and so the code that was used by Kruger in 2011, was not working at present.
2. The Venn diagrams which were outputted in Kruger's paper did not show the numbers of elements that each group had, and this was thought to be useful.
3. The method described in Kruger's paper expects you to know the numbers to use as the values for the Google Chart code. This %VENN macro automatically calculates those values for you and places them in the right sections to enable the diagram to be outputted.

Program 4 below was used to create a HTML file which contains an IMG tag. This IMG tag references the Google API and produces the specified proportional Venn diagram. All you need to do is open the HTML file in an internet browser, such as Internet Explorer, Mozilla Firefox or Google Chrome. This is an example program and in the %VENN macro the correct values are populated automatically (assuming you have specified the appropriate data set and variables). Also the data step in Program 4 does not contain any indents on purpose and this is so the correct string can be used as the IMG SRC reference.

Output 1 shows how the IMG tag looks in the HTML file.

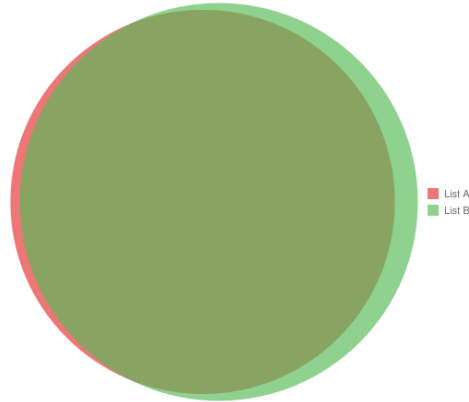


Figure 5: Proportional Two-Way Venn Diagram

Figure 5 below shows the proportional two-way Venn diagram. As you may recall, in Figure 2, 89% of the elements in List A intersected with the elements in List B, and this is reflected in the proportional Venn diagram as the two circles overlay a great deal. The macro call for Figure 5 is below:

In Figure 5, there are no numbers being displayed which show how much elements are in each group. To display this number in the legend then set the PROP_N_LABEL macro variable value to be 1.

Figure 6, shows the Venn diagram with the numbers of each group displayed in the legend. The macro call for Figure 6 is below:

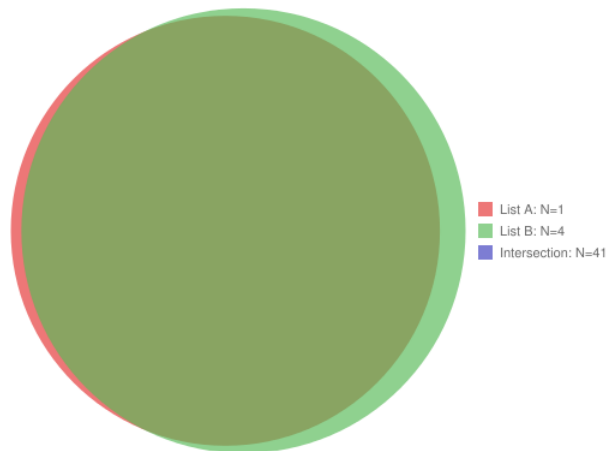


Figure 6: Proportional Two-Way Venn Diagram with Number in each Group

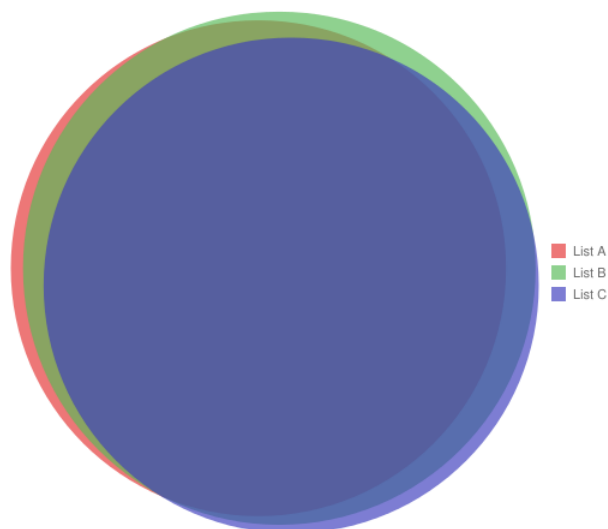


Figure 7: Proportional Three-Way Venn Diagram

Figure 7 below shows an example of a three-way Venn diagram. If you want to add the N numbers in the legend then all you need to do is set the PROP_N_LABEL macro variable value to be 1, as in Figure 6. The macro call for Figure 7 is below:

CONCLUSION

Venn Diagrams are very useful for visualizing the relationships between groups. This paper has demonstrated how the technique can be implemented using SAS 9.4, with aesthetically pleasing results.

This paper is an updated version of a previous Venn diagram poster that was presented in 2013, and the improvements are that the %VENN macro now works with qualitative data, some checks are done on the macro variables values to help to ensure that only valid values are used, and also the macro now (indirectly) produces proportional Venn diagrams.

Further upgrades can be made to allow the macro to be able to select parts of the Venn diagram and then see the elements that are in that group, and to generate proportional Venn diagrams entirely within SAS. Also to automatically reduce the font size if the numbers in the groups are very large.
